the Founder of The Light House Voc-Ed Center. She is also a tireless advocate for those who cannot speak for themselves; a Girl Scout volunteer; a Charter member and President of the CT Shoreline Chapter of Soroptomist International — an organization committed to empowering women and girls locally and internationally; and she is a consultant, working with several area non-profits to raise funds and increase their capacity.

"For 25 years, Kathy's career was dedicated to serving others through her work at The Light House. With a mission to educate and prepare individuals with disabilities for life, The Light House serves all of Eastern

Connecticut. The Light House has grown to be one of the main human service organizations in our region thanks to Kathy's leadership. More importantly, Kathy's efforts have made a

tremendous difference in the life of each person who has participated in their programs.

"But this work only scratches the surface of who Kathy is and why she is so special.

"Kathy is selfless, always thinking about how she can help. She is often a catalyst who brings people together to form a more effective and powerful whole. She collaborated with other Network members to create the All Benefits Children Bowl-a-thon to benefit The Light House, Emerson Theater Collaborative and Higher Edge. More recently, she brought together STEPS, Girl Scouts, Girls on the Run and Soroptimist International for a Girl Power

bowling fundraiser. She lead this effort to a tremendously successful end, raising a good amount of money for each of the organizations involved.

"Many organizations in our community have benefitted from Kathy's leadership — including the Women's Network.

"Kathleen O'Beirne shares this memory of when Kathy took the helm of the Network as the 2016-2017 President:

"'At Kathy's initial strategic planning session as president, her organizational skills and vision became clear! She broke us into small groups to tackle several key challenges and then had us debrief the whole group. What seemed overwhelming at first became more feasible as we heard the time lines and folks volunteered to head up specific initiatives. She helped Women's Network take a giant leap into the future by getting all of our materials on-line. Monthly board meetings kept us mostly on track, and her gentle leadership helped the group weather delays and set-backs, to be expected with such a major overhaul. She was truly a 'beacon of hope'!'

"I have been fortunate to collaborate with Kathy on many projects. We worked together on the committee for the event celebrating the joint 40th anniversaries of the Network, Safe Futures and of women being admitted to the Coast Guard Academy. Our task: to create a resource fair. Working with Kathy was all about creating the best thing we could, dividing up the tasks and keeping each other focused. At the fair, Soroptimist International had a table. They mentioned that they wanted very much to create a new chapter in the region. Of course, Kathy was involved from day one in helping to create the charter and to lead and build the chapter. Our local chapter, thanks to Kathy's involvement, has had much success in its short life. What motivates Kathy most in this work is our Live Your Dream program in which we empower women who are female heads

of their household with funds to help them better their situation through education or other training; and our Dream It, Be It programs which empower middle and high school girls through skill-building and mentoring activities. Kathy quietly and persistently leads us forward in growing these efforts.

"In closing, I want to share these remarks sent by Camilla Ross, which beautifully sum up Kathy's impact:

"'Dear Kathy, I am honored to be able to say that I know you from the heart.

" 'Your giving of yourself for the communities in which you serve is like no other. Our world sits in a better place because of you and all the amazing work that you do and have done.

"'To be able to create the All Benefits Children's Project with you was a true education and learning experience for me. It allowed my leadership skills to grow in new directions so that I could help others grow.

"The Light House was so instrumental in helping my son grow into the young man he is today is because of you. I thank you from the bottom of my heart and it's an honor to have you as our Women of the Year.

"'What I miss the most is not being able to be there to hug you and say thank you.'

"Kathy, as the founder of The Lighthouse, you have been a light for others in our community for over twenty-five years. You are a light because you brighten a room with your presence. You are also a light because you guide others, lead them, find a path forward for them - whether they be women, fellow non-profit leaders, young girls or those with special needs. You are a beacon who brings people together to form a greater good and to create greater good.

"It gives me great pleasure to present you with this much-deserved award. Please accept this gift as a symbol of your direction, leadership and vision."


